Nonprofit Management Program Faculty Committee, Program Faculty, and Advisory Council: Structure and Functions

A. Nonprofit Management Program Faculty Committee

Faculty governance functions for the proposed M.S. in Nonprofit Management and Leadership will be carried out by a multidisciplinary Nonprofit Management Program Faculty Committee composed of faculty members with Graduate Faculty status at UWM as follows: three from the faculty of the College of Letters and Science participating in the program; three from the faculty of the School of Business Administration participating in the program; three from the faculty of other schools or colleges at UWM with teaching, research, and/or other programmatic interests in the nonprofit sector, nonprofit organizations, nonprofit management and leadership, philanthropy or other closely related topics; and the Executive Director of the Helen Bader Institute for Nonprofit Management (*ex officio; non-voting*).

Appointments of the faculty representatives from the College of Letters and Science and the School of Business Administration will be made annually through the normal procedures established for such appointments in each academic unit. The three faculty members from other schools and colleges as specified above will be appointed by the Deans of the College of Letters and Science and the School of Business Administration with the concurrence of the Dean of the school or college in which the faculty member holds her/his appointment. All faculty members selected for the Nonprofit Management Program Faculty Committee shall have teaching, research, or programmatic interests or expertise related to nonprofit management and leadership. Each year the Nonprofit Management Program Faculty Committee will appoint one of its nine faculty members to serve as Chair of the Committee and Program Coordinator.

The Nonprofit Management Program Faculty Committee will establish and maintain academic policy jurisdiction over the proposed M.S. in Nonprofit Management and Leadership subject to the rules and regulations of the UWM Graduate School. Specifically, the committee will be responsible for recommending curricular direction and the determination of and revisions to the curricula of the proposed program. Any new course development, programmatic changes, or name change for the proposed program must be submitted to and approved by the appropriate curricular committees and faculty in the respective academic units (i.e., the Graduate Program Committee and the Faculty of the College of Letters and Science and the Master of Science Program Committee and the Faculty of the School of Business Administration), as well as by the Graduate School.

B. Nonprofit Management Program Faculty

A Nonprofit Management Program Faculty will also be appointed for the proposed program to (1) serve in an "advise and counsel" role on major changes in program direction; (2) take an active role in supporting the intellectual growth of students, faculty, and the community concerning nonprofit management and leadership; and (3) serve as advisors to students in the proposed program. Members of the Program Faculty will include the nine members of the Nonprofit Management Program Faculty Committee and other members of the faculty at UWM with teaching, research and/or other programmatic interests and expertise in nonprofit organizations, the nonprofit sector, nonprofit management and leadership and philanthropy.

Recommendations for members of the faculty and instructional staff at UWM to be appointed as members of the Program Faculty (other than those also serving as members of the Nonprofit Management Program Faculty Committee) shall be made by the Nonprofit Management Program Faculty Committee to the Deans of the appropriate schools or colleges. These appointments shall be made by the appropriate deans.

C. Nonprofit Management Program Advisory Council

A Nonprofit Management Program Advisory Council made up of community representatives, will be appointed by the Deans of the College of Letters and Science and the School of Business Administration. The members of the Advisory Council should represent the diverse constituencies relevant to nonprofit sector management and leadership and be appropriately diverse.

The Advisory Council's principal role will be to provide advice and assistance to the Deans of the College of Letters and Science and the School of Business Administration, the Nonprofit Management Program Faculty Committee, and the Executive Director of the Helen Bader Institute for Nonprofit Management.
