

RECOMMENDATION OF THE CENTER FOR INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION

ADD FOUR TRACKS TO THE BACHELOR OF ARTS IN GLOBAL STUDIES

Recommendation:

That the Faculty of the College approve the addition of four new tracks (Global Cities, Global Classrooms, Global Communication, and Global Security) to the Bachelor of Arts in Global Studies as well as other organizational changes that are related to the addition of these new tracks.

I. Current

Bachelor of Arts in Global Studies

The College of Letters and Science and the School of Business Administration have formed a partnership to offer students a unique program of study that will prepare them for positions of global leadership in our increasingly integrated world. The B.A. in Global Studies combines the considerable strengths of a liberal arts and sciences education with the specialized knowledge of professional studies. Course work includes geopolitics, political risk analysis, micro- and macroeconomics, contemporary language and culture, diplomacy and negotiation, a full sequence of professional courses related specifically to the demands of a global environment, and a strong emphasis on communication skills. The program requires four years of foreign language studies, a semester of study abroad, and an international internship. While graduates of the BAGS program will have a competitive advantage especially in areas of employment that benefit from an international education, the analytical, communication, and cultural awareness knowledge and skills acquired through BAGS will serve students well in any area of work.

Currently, the BAGS degree has a single track, Global Management, available to students. Several additional programs with emphases in other professional areas are under development. The Global Management track will prepare students to assume leadership roles

in many areas, but it will be especially advantageous in such fields as international business, consulting, education, government, and public policy. In addition, BAGS graduates in this track will meet all the foundation course work requirements for admission to an MBA program.

Admission. Admission to the B.A. in Global Studies is open to any student who fulfills UWM's admission standards. At the time of admission to UWM, the student should consult with a BAGS advisor in the Center for International Education (Garland Hall 102) who will assist him/her in planning a program of study. Competency in a foreign language will be helpful, but it is not required to enter the program. Because foreign language skills are fundamental to this degree, however, it is essential that students begin their study of a foreign language early in the program.

Curriculum Requirements. To earn the BA in Global Studies through the Global Management track, students must complete 120 credits while fulfilling the following requirements:

* Students enroll for 1 cr each semester they are in the program; they must earn a minimum of 4 cr and may count a maximum of 8 cr toward the degree.

ENRICHMENT STUDIES

Students must spend a semester abroad, usually in the junior year, and must complete an internship in an area related to the focus of their studies. The internship normally will be completed in the summer following the semester abroad or in the senior year. Electives to reach a total of 120 credits may be selected according to a student's interests. Prerequisite courses in English, math, or other areas will count toward electives. Students may take additional study abroad experiences through 3-4 week programs offered in UWinterIM or in the summers as part of their electives. While students may participate in any approved study abroad program, the following programs have been developed specifically for BAGS:

Awarding the Degree.

Students following the BAGS curriculum are awarded the Bachelor of Arts degree jointly by the College of Letters and Science and the School of Business Administration.

II. Proposed Change Summary

- A. Create four additional tracks, Global Classrooms, with two options; Global Cities, with two options; Global Communications; and Global Security.
- B. Clarify the process for entering the major.
- C. Require at least 36 credits in advanced level (300+) course work.
- D. Reorder and clarify the sections under Curriculum Requirements as follows:
GENERAL STUDIES - CORE REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL TRACKS
ENRICHMENT STUDIES - REQUIRED FOR ALL TRACKS
SPECIALIZED STUDIES
- E. Under Enrichment Studies, add the subheadings "Study Abroad," "International Internship," and "General Education Requirements;" omit specific study abroad courses listed; specify that the internship must be completed outside the U.S.
- F. Delete Math 211 from the General Studies core requirements and add it under the Specialized Studies requirements for the Global Management track; raise the number of NS credits required in the core to 6-7 cr.
- G. Delete Commun 550 from the General Studies core requirements; add a Specialized Studies requirement for Commun 350, 450 or 550 to the Global Management track;
- H. Delete Global 190, 290, 390, 490 from Specialized Studies for the Global Management track and add them to General Studies core requirements.
- I. Modify the Capstone requirement (Global 500) to indicate other options may be acceptable.
- J. Modify the description of the foreign language requirement to make it easier to understand.
- K. Modify the "Awarding the Degree" section to indicate that the degree will be jointly awarded by the College of Letters and Science and different schools/colleges, depending upon which track the student follows.

IV. Justification

- A. The current track in Global Management does not serve students whose interests lie outside of business and/or management. The Global Classrooms proposed track will appeal to students who wish to teach at the K-12 level and who want to have a coherent global focus for their coursework. The Global Cities proposed track will allow students to explore such issues as the history and economy of global cities, the causes and implications of urban growth, and international architectural design. The Global Communications track will allow students to build technical competencies while also grounding them in a broader understanding of technology's impact on human lives. The Global Security track will prepare students to pursue careers in government agencies and non-governmental organizations addressing areas such as international development, global conflict management, and global sustainability. The proposed change does not alter the current Global Management track; it merely makes other options available to students.
- B. The old language on admission to the major did not give information on the specific steps to be taken for students to enter the program.
- C. All degree programs require that a certain number of credits must be taken at the advanced level. It would not be appropriate to grant a baccalaureate degree based only on freshman- and sophomore-level courses. Thirty-six is within the range of advanced credits typically required. When Global Management was the only track, it was not necessary to state the advanced credit requirement explicitly because the program requirements guaranteed students would have more than that number. That is not the case with some of the new tracks, so the advanced credit requirement is being made explicit.
- D. These are editorial changes that emphasize the common core of the Global Studies degree program.
- E. The subheadings clarify the nature of the program's Enrichment Studies and emphasize the important role of general education studies as part of the program. There are numerous study abroad options appropriate for students in the program. The three currently listed are not offered regularly enough to warrant singling

them out for special notice. The Advisory Committee wishes to require a non-U.S. internship, which will be a more valuable and appropriate experience for this program than a U.S. internship would be.

- F. The calculus course is appropriate for the Global Management track, but not all of the new tracks being developed will need that level of math. Because Math 211 carries natural science credits, its removal from the core lowers the total number of NS credits in the core; therefore, the requirement is increased to ensure that all students have two NS courses. Math 211 will continue to count toward the NS requirement for students in the management track.
- G. The focus of Commun 550 is appropriate for the Global Management track, but it is not necessary for the new tracks being developed. Commun 350 and Commun 450 are added as options because Commun 550 is not offered every semester and requires either of these courses as a prerequisite.
- H. Participation in the Think Tank courses was intended as a requirement for all students in the degree program. The perspectives of students in different tracks will enhance the value of discussions focused on various global issues.
- I. Students must complete a capstone experience, but there may be alternatives to the Global 500 course that are appropriate options for one or more of the tracks. This change leaves open the possibility of counting other appropriate capstone courses for that core requirement.
- J. The emphases on business and literature/culture stated in the first two of the old foreign language options both can be accommodated in the new, more general statement that also is more appropriate for the new tracks being added. It is not appropriate to require a culture course; this may not be the best choice for a student's interests. With greater flexibility in course selection, special focus within those credits can be outlined, as appropriate, for individual students in any of the tracks.
- K. The revised information under the "Awarding the Degree" heading makes it clear that the degree is awarded jointly by L&S and another school/college, depending upon the track that the student follows. L&S and Bus Adm award degrees to students following the Global Management track; L&S and Educ award degrees to students following the Global Classrooms track; L&S and Architecture & Urban Planning award degrees to students following the Global Cities track; and L&S and SOIS award degrees to students following the Global Communication track (if at least 21 cr are taken in SOIS

courses). Students in the Global Security track will be awarded their degree by L&S because there is not a predominant professional school partner for this track.

Bachelor of Arts in Global Studies

The College of Letters and Science and several of UWM's professional schools have formed a partnership to offer students a unique program of study that will prepare them for positions of global leadership in our increasingly interconnected world.

The Bachelor of Arts in Global Studies combines the considerable strengths of a liberal arts and sciences education with the specialized knowledge of professional studies enhanced by a thorough, integrated international emphasis. While graduates of the Global Studies program will have a competitive advantage especially in areas of employment that benefit from an international education, the analytical, communication, and cultural awareness knowledge and skills acquired through the Global Studies degree will serve students well in any area of work.

Courses of Study

Global Studies at UWM is a four-year undergraduate program consisting of five pre-professional tracks: Global Cities, Global Classrooms, Global Communications, Global Management, and Global Security. Common to all tracks is the degree's core curriculum, which includes three foundational Global Studies core courses; one semester (12 cr minimum) of study abroad; an international internship; eight semesters (or equivalent) of foreign language study; a course in world regions; and at least four semesters of a (1 cr) discussion section called the "Think Tank Learning Community," a forum on global issues among fellow global studies students. In addition, students take specialized courses designated for their elected Global Studies track. All undergraduate students are required to meet the UWM General Education Requirements (see below).

The Global Cities track will prepare students as future architects, urban planners, or specialists in Geographic Information Systems (GIS) to conceptualize, design, and implement projects in a global context. Students acquire an understanding of the global dimensions and local variations of architecture, including the history and economy of global cities, the causes and implications of urban growth, and international architectural design.

The Global Classrooms track will prepare students as future educators capable of research, teaching, and curriculum development with an international dimension. Through the study of foreign languages and cultures and of globalization and its consequences for where and how people live, it will provide cultural contexts for teachers working in the modern multicultural classroom. Students who complete the Global Classrooms track will

have fulfilled part of the requirements for certification to teach. (For admission requirements to the School of Education and additional coursework for teaching certification, see the information** following the Global Classrooms requirements and Appendix A.)

The Global Communications track focuses on the relevance of language, culture, and identity in understanding innovations in and applications of technology, media, communications, information science, and technology transfer. This track will allow students to build technical competencies while also grounding them in a broader understanding of technology's impact on human lives. This track affords a range of options that allows students to prepare for careers in fields such as marketing, international business, advertising, information technology, new media, and translation.

The Global Management track, focusing on the impact of globalization on business and the world economy, will prepare students as future managers capable of analyzing transnational issues; strategizing within a global, cross-cultural context; and implementing projects with a strong understanding of globalization's implications for the private and public sectors. This track will prepare students to assume leadership roles in many areas, but it will be advantageous especially in such fields as international business, consulting, education, government, and public policy. In addition, graduates of this track will meet all the course requirements for admission to an MBA program.

The Global Security track examines the changing conceptions and conditions shaping security in a global context. In addition to exploring traditional notions of security based on the nation-state and the international system, coursework in this track considers a wide range of issues including global health, the environment, human rights, peace-building efforts, 21st century conflict, social movements, migration, ethnicity, and identity. This track will prepare students to pursue careers in government agencies and non-governmental organizations addressing areas such as international development, global conflict management, and global sustainability.

Enrolling in the Global Studies B.A. Degree Program

Students applying to the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and declaring a primary interest in global studies on their application forms will be assigned a Global Studies advisor at the Center for International Education. Students may enroll in the Global Studies degree program by declaring their major as global studies, which is possible after they have earned 56 credits. The process includes (1) reviewing the degree requirements with a Global Studies advisor and (2) signing the declaration of major form. Students who intend to pursue a Global Studies degree are strongly advised to declare before earning 75 credits.

Curriculum Requirements. To earn the Bachelor of Arts in Global Studies, students in all tracks must complete 120 credits, including a minimum of 36 credits in upper-division courses (numbered 300 or above), while fulfilling the requirements below.

Students also are responsible for completing the University-wide General Education Requirements.

Global Studies Capstone (3 cr) - Culminating experience in the senior year. Students must complete a capstone course appropriate to their track.

World Regions course (3 cr) - Introduction to area studies.

Note: Students following Global Classroom, Track B requirements must take either Geog 110 or Pol Sci 106 if History is their major area and must take either Geog 110 or Hist 132 if Pol Sci is their major area.

Foreign Language - The requirement may be satisfied in one of the following ways*:

Option 1 One Language: Eight semesters (or equivalent) of a single foreign language with passing grades.

Option 2 Two Languages: First- through fifth-semester (or equivalent) of a first language other than English and three semesters (or equivalent) in a second language other than English with passing grades.

*Global Classrooms concentrators who specialize in foreign language must fulfill the language requirements of their program.

ENRICHMENT STUDIES - REQUIRED FOR ALL TRACKS

Study Abroad

Students must complete a minimum of 12 credits while studying abroad.

International Internship

Students must complete a 3-credit internship at a location outside of the U.S. The internship normally will be completed during the

semester abroad, in the summer following the semester abroad, or in the senior year.

General Education Distribution Requirements

In order to build a foundation in the arts, humanities, social sciences, and natural sciences, students are required to take courses that satisfy the distribution areas of the UWM General Education Requirements (GERs), as outlined below:

Cultural Diversity, 3 cr

Natural Sciences, including one lab, 6-7 cr

Humanities, 12 cr (3 cr of which may be satisfied by selecting Hist 132 under the world regions course options)

To earn the Bachelor of Arts in Global Studies through the Global Cities track, students must complete the following set of core courses and must choose to specialize in either of two areas: Option A - Architecture or Option B - Urbanism. Students pursuing this track must meet the admission requirements for the School of Architecture and Urban Planning (SARUP) and should consult with the Student Advising Office in SARUP in addition to a Global Studies advisor at the Center for International Education. Only students who advance to Level 2 in SARUP may complete the architecture option, and those who apply for Level 2 in SARUP must complete an additional 3 credit in Arts courses.
